Improvisation

Last month Mal Stewart demonstrated how he had improvised making a connection from his hand held sander to his dust extractor. The impetus for this came from his wife Wendy, who was both concerned for Mal's health and for her car. (Mal's workshop is also their garage) Mal opined that sometimes concern for her car might be a priority!!!

Mal used a heat gun on a small length of PVC tubing to improvise a connecting piece. After heating, one end of the tubing was fitted over a flattened oval form to fit the sander, while the other end had it's diameter reduced, using two shaped blocks to fit the tube of the dust extractor. Computer Dovetails!

If you have access to a computer and want an easy quick way to layout dovetails, go to Google and put in "Dovetail Generator." This will give you a tool where you simply enter the relevant information and it will create a template for you giving accurate cutting lines.

Fold the printed template over the wood, and hold in place with a temporary spray glue. Then go ahead and cut through the paper template.

For example I clicked on

Width: 100mm Pitch: 1:6 Tails:3

Tail thickness: 12mm Socket thickness: 12mm

Even gaps and Tails Even spacing

And then clicked Calculate

And the template appeared on the screen.

Press **Print** and you have it. Glue or pin the template to the timber and away you go
